Lewis said the interference is caused by a "slight" second harmonic problem because of the high power of WEDK and the low power of Channel 8 in this area. Lewis noted that it is not the intent of WEDK to interfere with any stations but he added the educational station is operating under federal regulations. He said Springfield could be considered a fringe area for Channel 8.

TV Affected. Lewis said efforts will be made to eliminate interference and engineers from Channel 8 have been invited here to discuss the problem.

Persons complaining about WEDK interference said Channel 8 is the only one affected. Broadcasting with a power output of 15,000 watts, WEDK is one of the most powerful FM stations in New England and services Western Massachusetts and the Connecticut Valley.
