NEW STATION WBZA OPENED

Westinghouse Radio Studio Atop Statler Puts on First Program

WIFE OF HOTEL MAN CHRISTENS PLANT

Boston's newest radio station, Westinghouse radio station WBZA, atop the Hotel Statler, at 7:07 o'clock last night radioed its greeting to untold thousands of listeners, in a program that lasted until the wee small hours of this morning. The opening was auspicious. Each and every number was run on schedule, from the moment Gov. Fuller pushed the button at his Beacon street residence, switching the power from the old transmitter to the new, until the Knights of Pythias quartet ended the program shortly after 1:10 o'clock this morning.

Sharing honors at the opening were men and women prominent in public life, artists of varied talents, as well as leading officials of the Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing Company, owners of the new station and stations KDKA at Pittsburgh, WBZ at Springfield and KYW at Chicago. Among the Westinghouse officials taking part in the opening were: J. C. McQuiston, manager of the department of publicity; Lloyd C. Thomas, commercial manager of all the radio stations of the company; C. W. Horne, superintendent of radio operations; J. P. Alexander, manager of the Boston office of the company; and A. E. 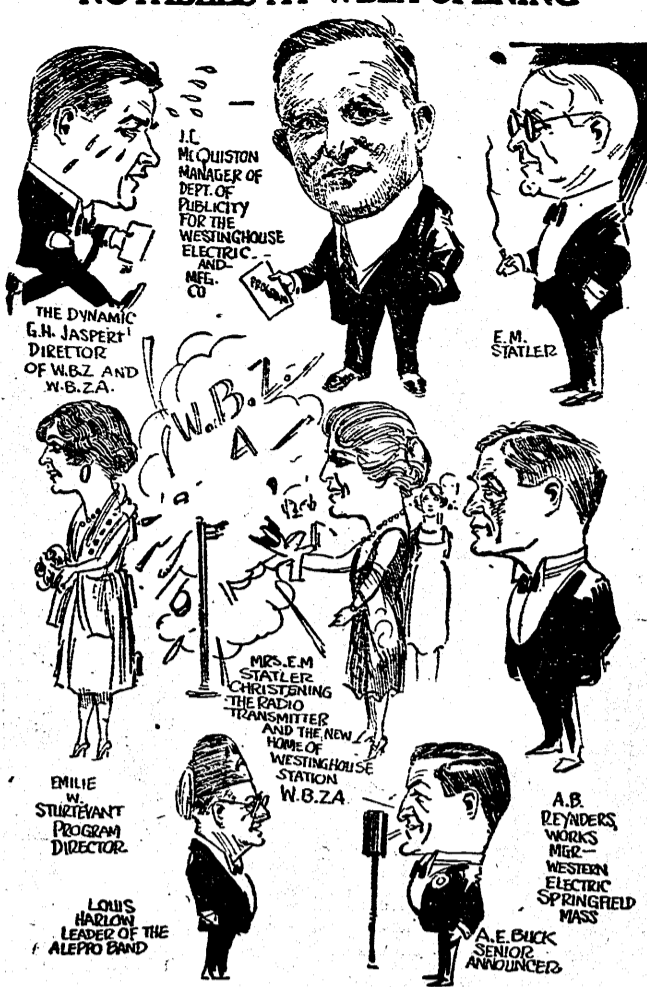

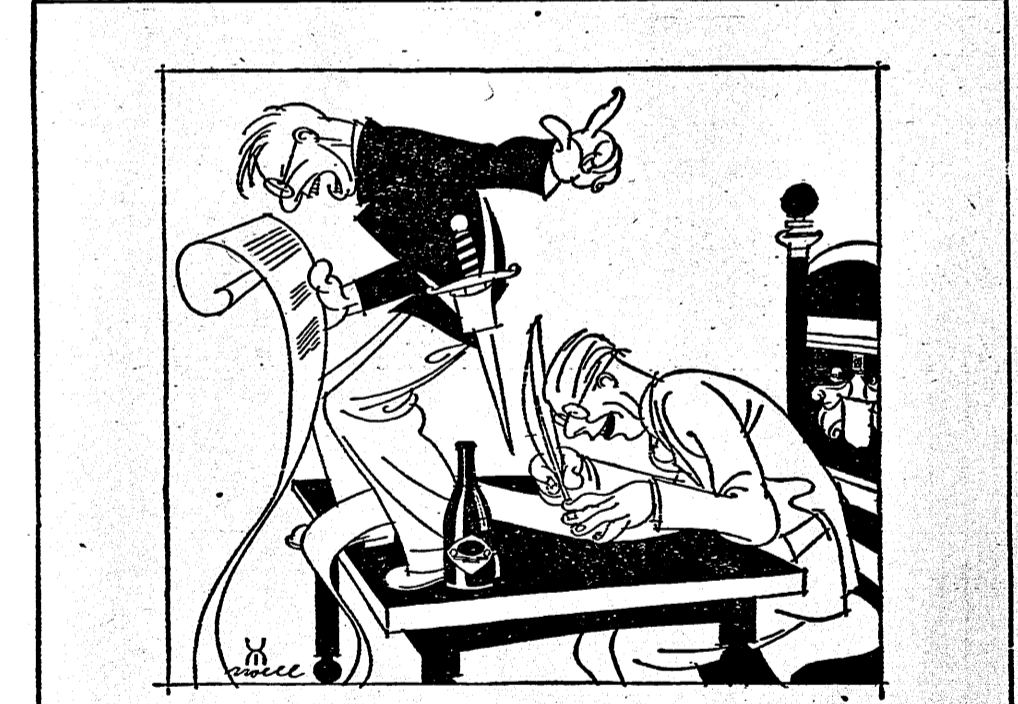
