dividual champions. But the home squad really cashed in on second places—grabbing an advantage of 22-7—good for 66 points. Pittsfield had 14 thirds and Greater Springfield eight.

The relay also gave the winners an extra push toward the team trophy. Greater Springfield won five of the six for a total of 30 more points.

The array of swim talent on hand managed to leave a huge dent in the meet record book. No less than 12 marks were smashed and one was tied in the greatest assault on the clock produced in the five-year history of the meet. Two times also went into the books for newly established events for future challenge.

Eight Double Winners

Eight double winners were crowned—five of them representing Greater Springfield. They were Beverly and Cindy Butler, Dennis Bourcier, Steve Olson

and Kris Gruenheck. The latter two and Cindy Butler also scored twin triumphs in Sunday's 12th annual Greater Springfield meet. Thus each touched home first in four events in two days—a remarkable showing of stamina and speed.

Pittsfield's double champs were Gregg Eason, Larry Bushey and Mark Bernum. Bushey and Bernum each smashed records in their two specialties.

Bushey's records came in the 11-12 20-yard backstroke and 40-yard breaststroke. Bernum thrashed his way home in record time of 22.7 in the 11-12 40-yard freestyle and followed up with a new clocking of 26.2 in the 40-yard butterfly.

Some Surprises

Olson whittled his own previous mark of 42.3 down to 41.9 in the 16-18 80-yard freestyle and then put a mark of 20.8 for the 40-yard butterfly into the book. Miss Gruenheck cut two full seconds off the former meet mark of Sue Haughey in the 16-18 80-yard freestyle with a time of 50.0. Then in the 40-yard butterfly,

also included for the first time, was clocked in 23.8.

Some surprises were registered. Most notable among them were the failure of Rick Scott and Sue Silvia, both of Springfield, to register a first place.

Both scored double wins Sunday. Scott wound up with a second and third as did Miss Silvia.

Other record breakers were Eason, Cindy Butler, Meredith Berman, Kim Varzas, Sarah Appleby and Kathi Moore. Beverly Butler tied a record in the 11-12 20-yard freestyle and now shares the mark of 11.2 jointly with her sister Cynthia and Sue Reed.

Also emerging as first-place victors were Chuck Smith Glenn Benoit, Jean Franchetois, Cathy Okolita, Donna Marchitto, Elaine Baker, Dave Marchitto, Sarah Appleby and Laurie Fuller.

The Union was happy to award members of both teams handsome billfolds following the meet. In addition, the Pittsfield team was treated to a dinner at Sam's Restaurant before embarking on its return trip home.

Asks Title Bout Be Outlawed

LONDON (UPI) — The British Boxing Board of Control is asking the American World Boxing Association to outlaw the proposed world heavyweight championship return fight between Sonny Liston and Cassius Clay. It was announced Monday.

Teddy Waltham, the board's general secretary, said, "Any such fight would be the result of a return-match contract, which the whole of boxing now affirms to be highly undesirable."

He went on, "This, plus the unsatisfactory nature of the first Clay-Liston fight in Miami last February, makes the whole business of a return bout deplorable, undesirable and a great disservice to the sport."

"The European Boxing Union and the New York Athletic Commission have already expressed similar views, officially. That leaves only the so-called World Boxing Association, and we are hoping that they, too, will show a sense of unity in seeing that this fight does not take place in any of their affiliated states."

DUNEDIN, Fla. (UPI) — Ken Venturi's victory in the American Golf Classic Sunday enabled him to vault from seventh to fifth place in the professional golfers money earnings standings, the PGA announced Monday.

Lena Thron, who won \$7500 in the classic, has earned \$53,840.21. Jack Nicklaus, the leading money winner, boosted his earnings to \$99,117.83 on his fourth place finish in the Classic. Arnold Palmer remains behind Nicklaus with \$93,743.37 after placing third at Akron.

Tony Lema held third place with \$70,938.70, followed by Bill Casper, Jr. with \$64,886.41.

Gary Player dropped from fifth to sixth place with \$52,949.54 and Juan Rodriguez fell one notch to seventh with \$46,728.85.

Completing the top 10 are Mason Rudolph, who finished second to Venturi in the Classic with \$43,612.85; Mike Souchak (\$37,533.39) and Bob Nichols (\$37,087.26).

Pittsfield absorbed its fifth consecutive team dunking during The Springfield Union's annual Springfield-Pittsfield Invitational meet at Emerson Wight Pool on Monday, but for the first time in the history of the meet the Greater Berkshire swimmers held their own as far as individual awards were concerned.

"I'm more than satisfied with our team's performance," said John Marchesi, Pittsfield's recreation supervisor, who served as chaperone for the Pittsfield contingent.

"Gee," Marchesi exclaimed, "our gang took four firsts in the first seven events, but we were still trailing in points."

"Depth is our big problem," he said, "Sure, we were able to score our share of first place finishes, but when you take a look at who grabbed the majority of second and thirds, that's where we fell off."

"Springfield had too much depth for us to contend with," Marchesi added, "but I feel as though our crew is headed in the right direction."

"All I can add," he said, was, "we'll be back next year with even a stronger team." A majority of Pittsfield's firsts went to boys and girls in the younger age group which serves to bolster Pittsfield's team hopes for upcoming years.

Brothers Larry and Ricky Bushey of the Pittsfield team had quite a busy swimming weekend. Both won gold medals at an Olympic Meet in Saratoga, N. Y. on Sunday. At Saratoga, Larry took first in the 50-meters breaststroke, while Ricky finished off front in the 50-meters backstroke. Larry was a double winner against Springfield, taking both the boys' 11-12 40-yard breaststroke and the boys' 11-12 20-yard backstroke.

Ludlow's Dennis Bourcier accomplished his first double victory after competing in the invitational meet for the past four years. A single event winner in years past, Dennis splashed to victories in both the boys' 13-15 and 16-18 backstroke events on Monday. Dennis, who will be a senior at Ludlow High in September, is a member of the Ludlow Boys' Club swimming team.
