CHARLES CANFIELD, FORMER ELECTRICAL ENGINEER, IS DEAD

Gained Distinction in Alternating Current Work — Succumbs After Illness — Funeral Tomorrow

Pittsfield, July 13—Charles E. Canfield, 70, a retired electrical and mechanical engineer who gained distinction in the alternating current field, died last night after a long illness at his home, 28 Southampton street. He leaves his widow, the former Miss Martha E. Hoyt of Pittsfield; two daughters, Mrs. George W. Robinson of Boston, and Miss Alice M. Canfield of Pittsfield; and one grandson, Charles Canfield Robinson. The funeral will be held Tuesday at 2 p. m. at Wellington funeral home, entered by Rev. Ralph H. Hayden, rector of St. Stephen's Episcopal church, officiating. Burial will be in Evergreen cemetery at Arlington, Vt., at 4 p. m.

Mr. Canfield was born at Arlington, Oct. 13, 1870, son of Charles and Caroline (White) Canfield. He attended public schools there and at Baltimore, Md., and entered the University of Vermont at Burlington, graduating as an electrical engineer in 1898. The following year Mr. Canfield came to Pittsfield and became an employee of the Standard Electric Manufacturing company as a draftsman. He showed exceptional skill in 1906 when he was promoted to assistant engineer in charge of the plant. He was associated with the late William Stanley and John P. Kelly as engineers for the A. L. Chalmers company in Milwaukee, Wis., for a period of four years, until October, 1908. Mr. Canfield was an engineer for the Western Electric company in charge of alternating current generator design and was widely recognized as an authority in this field. For two years, from 1908, Mr. Canfield was chief engineer for the Warren Electric company in Springfield, O. From the spring of 1909 until August, 1910, he was chief engineer in charge of alternating current design for the General Electric company at Pittsfield. In August, 1919, Mr. Canfield came to Pittsfield as a mechanical engineer for the Central Electric company and continued in that position until his retirement three months ago. Mr. Canfield was a member of Pittsfield section, American Institute of Electrical Engineers, a member of the Canadian Engineering club. He was a member of the Pittsfield Stanley Electric company, a member of the Pittsfield Pipe and Foundry club, and a member of the Lodge of Masons at Arlington, Vt., and attended St. Stephen's Episcopal church, Pittsfield.

S. A. STARKWEATHER, EX-WOMEN'S RELIEF PRESIDENT, IS DEAD

Once Headed State Organization — Was Widow of Civil War Veteran — Visited Women Prisoners

Pittsfield, July 13—Mrs. Sarah Anna Starkweather, 76, a widow, former Starkweather, a Civil War veteran, died early today at her home, 324 West Housatonic street. She was one of the founders of the Massachusetts Women's Relief corps. She was a member of Peace Party chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, a charter member of Morning-side Baptist church and for many years was active in the W. C. T. U., of whose county organization she had served as president. Mrs. Starkweather was born at Worcester, N. Y., November 4, 1865. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Quenell. She was educated at Brainbridge academy and taught in New York city public schools for nine years before her marriage in 1891 to Mr. Starkweather, for many years school trustee officer and one-time commander of Berkshire post of the United States Army. He died November 19, 1933.

Mrs. Starkweather became identified with the Berkshire Women's Relief corps soon after she came to this city 50 years ago, as a member of the organization in 1904 and succeeded Mrs. William Francis Bartlett as chaplain. She had served twice on the board of national president and her election as state president was celebrated here with a reception in the old Grand Army hall attended by members of the organization from all over the western part of the state. In her devotion to and work for the Berkshire post and relief corps, Mrs. Starkweather had few if any equals in this county. She was charged with the Memorial day banquet assembly gathering in the Veterans' building on School street last Monday day. She was always enlisted her helpful support. During the administration of Sheriff John Jossey and Charles W. Fuller of the State Prison, she was a visitor to women at the jail. For four years she was secretary to the Kings Daughters, Berkshire branch. Mrs. Starkweather was in superior court, Mrs. Starkweather made so effective a plea for a woman defendant that the prisoner was released. She was present at the annual meeting of the present American flags to the public schools and to instruct school children in the foundation principles of patriotism. With her unselfish work for patriotic organizations, Mrs. Starkweather found time for active participation in various Morning-side church societies. AIRPORT RUNWAYS MAY BE FINISHED DURING THIS WEEK

Passenger Planes Perhaps Will Resume Landings — New Lights to Be Flush With Hardened Surface

Westfield, July 13—This coming week may witness completion of the hardening and runway at Barnes airport to a point where officials of the American Airlines, Inc., will allow its passenger ships to resume landings. The runway, which is 4000 feet long, will be completed with its last two-inch "top dressing." The company desires that about 2000 feet of the easterly side of the two other runways, extending easterly from the main runway, be top dressed so that no workers will be within that distance from any landing place. It is more than possible that work on these two strips will be completed this week. Plans have been made to install a new set of runway lights that will be flush with the hardened surface. The new runway lights, which have been in use will be used, but they will be placed at the edge of the dirt and grass runways several hundred feet from the hardened surface, which are 150 feet wide. The wire landscape fence in front of the administration building has been completed and is constructed to insure a maximum of safety for passengers arriving and departing on the airliners.
