The 38th annual meeting of the Jewish Social Service Bureau will take place Monday, the 8th, at 8:15 p. m. at the Jewish Community Center.

Participants in a panel discussion on "Needs of the Jewish family," will be: Rabbi Leonard Zoll, newly appointed assistant rabbi at Sinai Temple, Hillel counselor at Springfield College and American International College and formerly a social worker for New York Department of Welfare-Senior Citizens' Program.

Rabbi Zoll will deal with the religious aspects of Jewish family living. Dr. Aaron M. Leavitt, a psychiatrist now in private practice here, who for the past two years was a lieutenant-commander in the Navy and chief of neuropsychiatric service at Bainbridge Naval Center, Md. Donald Weisman, executive director of the Jewish Community Council, has been professionally involved in community work for the past 17 years in the general and Jewish communities. This has included executive and administrative positions in various agencies in Philadelphia, Newark and Schenectady.

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Moderator will be Maxwell H. Tasgal, executive director of the Jewish Community Center, Tasgal has been director of the center for the past 15 years. The Jewish Social Service Bureau, whose executive director is Mrs. Luella Stein, serves the Jewish community in the area of marriage and personal counseling, parent-child conflict, financial assistance, care of the aged, vocational assistance, psychiatric referral, resettlement of new Americans. The agency is located in the Red Feather Building, 84 Mill St., and derives sole support from the United Fund.
