Keep your clubs handy: Golf season lasts 7 months

There are approximately seven months in the Western Massachusetts golfing season.

With nearly 60 golf courses in the area, this means a newcomer to the four-county area could play twice a week without visiting the same course twice.

The more-populous Hampden County is the home of nearly half of

Some 25 percent are found in Berkshire County, with Hampshire County and Franklin County accounting for the other 25 percent.

Golf in this country dates back just over 100 years.

This section wasn't far behind in joining the golf scene as several clubs — Springfield, Stockbridge and Greenfield, among them back to the 1890's. Springfield and Stockbridge CCs are charter members of the Massachusetts Golf Association, founded in 1903, with Holyoke CC joining in 1910.

Stockbridge Golf Club's annual invitation tournament is older than both the Massachusetts Amateur and Massachusetts Open. The June Invi-tation at Springfield Country Club dates back to just after the turn of the century.

The post-World War II golf boom was felt heavily in Western Massachusetts. One-quarter of the area's courses have been built since that -WM golf clubs-

But, it isn't necessary to join a private club to enjoy golf; the semipublic, public and municipal courses offer real tests

Within a half-hour of Springfield, for example, there are numerous courses catering principally to the greens-fee players. In addition, there are four municipal courses for the public links golfers.

Three of the public courses are located in Agawam alone — Agawam CC, St. Anne and Oak Ridge. Others in this category include Edgewood and Southwick CC, both in Southwick; East Mountain in Westfield; and Southampton Country Club and Hickory Ridge in Amherst.

The city of Springfield has two municipally-operated golf courses, Franconia and Veterans Memorial, while there is one each at Chicopee's Chicopee CC and Ludlow's Westover.

Franconia is the oldest of the group, dating back to 1929. Veterans replaced the old Memorial golf course, which gave way to an indus-

Greens-fee weekdays at the two Springfield courses costs \$4.50, with a \$6.50 rate for weekends. The fee at Chicopee is \$7 weekdays and \$8 weekends. At Westover, the weekday fee is \$6 and \$7.50 on weekends. All four courses have special rates for qualified senior citizens.

An accompanying list shows the golf courses in Western Massachusetts with the nine-hole layouts indi-

Just over half the golf courses are of the 18-hole variety, most of which, again, are located in Hampden and Berkshire Counties. Country Club of Greenfield is the lone 18-hole course in Franklin County, with Southampton Country Club. Pine Grove and Hickory Ridge Country Club in Amherst the 18-hole layouts in

Hampshire County.

Golf is not as expensive in Western Massachusetts as it is in the eastern part of the state. A partial survey of the private clubs shows a family membership can be obtained at many clubs in the \$400-to-\$800 range. Of course, there are also several country clubs whose dues structure is much higher and who require an initiation fee to join.

For the most part, golf is it at Western Massachusetts clubs.

Longmeadow, Crestview (Agawam), Hampden, Shaker Farms (Westfield), Country Club of Pittsfield and Wyantenuck (Great Barrington) also boast swimming and tennis facilities.

Stockbridge, General Electric AA (Pittsfield) and Greenock (Lee) have tennis courts available. A few others, like Springfield, Elmcrest

Bay State sportsmen have goals to aim at

Massachusetts, for a small state, has some big-time fish and game records for sportsmen to aim at.

While the state also stocks trout,

pheasant and quail, big game, which in this state means the white- tail deer, black bear and wild turkey, is still the big apple of the hunter's eye. A license is not needed for saltwater fishing in this state, though

sportsmen's groups are pushing for To hunt or fish in Massachusetts it will cost a resident \$12.50 for each

several government agencies and

license. A special sportsman's or combo license allowing both can be purchased for \$19.50.

A hunting or combo license allows a sportsman to take both large and small game. A minor between 15 and 17 can

purchase a license for \$6.50. Special state stamps are needed to hunt waterfowl, or to hunt deer with bow and arrow or black-powder gun. A federal waterfowl stamp is also

needed. The prices of these stamps in-

crease from year to year. Here are some of the big-game records hunters have, not necessarily to aim at, but of which to be mindful.

Firearms record aimals - A 10point buck white-tailed deer, 265 pounds field dressed, taken by Robert Besaw of Westford in Huntington in 1955; a male black bear, 467 pounds dressed, taken by Karl Dewlett of Peru in Peru in 1980; a 41pound bobcat taken by Herm Hageman of Blandford in Berkshire County in 1977; a tom turkey, 21 pounds, 9 ounces dressed, taken by Mike Herrington of Pittsfield in Alford in

Archery records - A white-tailed deer, eight points, 240 pounds dressed, by Kevin Hearn of West Tisbury on Martha's Vineyard; a male black bear, 337 pounds, by Jim "Boomer" Hayden of Hopkinton in Cummington in 1982; a tom turkey, pounds, 7 ounces dressed, by Ron

Smith of Lee in 1981 in Tyringham. Fishermen are more mindful of records than hunters, mostly because they are written about more often and there are more fishermen.

Among the Bay State freshwater cords are a 6-pound, 4-ounce brook trout by Tom Lapfew at Otis Reserbrown trout by Dana DeBlois at Wachusett Reservoir in 1966; a 13pound rainbow by Jim Craven at Quabbin in 1984; a 9-pound, 11ounce, landlocked salmon by Bob Koske at Quabbin in 1975; a 15pound, 8-ounce largemouth bass by Walt Bolonis at Sampson's Pond in 1975; a 7-pound, 4-ounce smallmouth taken by Mike Howe from the Quaboag River in 1984; an 11-pound walleyed pike by Bob Methot at Quabbin in 1975; a 9-pound, 5-ounce chain pickerel by Mrs. James Martin in Laurel Lake in 1954; a 31-pound, 7ounce northern pike at the Oxbow by Roger Pyzocha in 1984: a 31-pound. 8-ounce carp in the Oxbow in 1983.

Among the salt-water records are 27-pound. 4-ounce bluefish by Louis Gordon off Graves Light in 1982; a 1,228-pound bluefin tuna by Marlene Goldstein in Cape Cod Bay in 1984; a 73-pound striped bass by Charles Church off Quicks' Hole in 1913 and by Charlie Cinto off Sow and Pigs in 1967 and by Anton Stetzko off Nauset Beach in 1981.

Massachusetts has a new worldrecord fish, yet the northern pike taken last month in Pontoosuck Lake is not a state record. The 26-pound, 9-ounce pike taken by Rod Teehan of Westfield has been

approved as a new, 16-pound-test-

line, rod and reel-class record. Strangely enough, while Teehan's world record is in the books, the largest northern ever taken here is still a 31-pound, 7-ounce pike taken by Roger Pyzocha of Ludlow two years ago while fishing the Oxbow in
